




## What is xMod?


Chopin's First Editions Online (CFEO) is a research project of three years' duration, running from 1 March 2004 to 28 February 2007. It is directed by Professor John Rink (Royal Holloway, University of London), in conjunction with Dr Marilyn Deegan and Mr Harold Short (King's College London), and run in collaboration with Research Assistants Dr Christophe Grabowski and Dr Danae Stefanou (Royal Holloway, University of London). The project is being funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Board within its Resource Enhancement Programme.


The project will create an online resource uniting all of Chopin's first editions in an unprecedented virtual collection. The archive will be drawn from four partner libraries (Bibliothèque Nationale de France, Bodleian Library, British Library, and Chopin Society Warsaw) and eighteen other institutions, totalling c.5,000 digital images of Chopin's music. The full score of each first impression will appear along with commentary on particularly significant textual features. In addition, there will be excerpts from the Annotated Catalogue of Chopin's First Editions. Innovative methodologies for complex textual interlinking and web delivery of this material will be devised at the Centre for Computing in the Humanities (CCH) using advanced imaging techniques allied with relevant open standards for metadata and interface design.

#### Anchorite


Someone who had spent a period of probation in a monastery and had received the permission of his abbot become a solitary. In the early Anglo-Saxon period an anchorite was held to be of high status within the church.


#### Army

This translates the Latin word *exercitus*. It was sometimes used in Asser's *Life of Alfred* to represent the C English **here**, usually with a qualifying word such as *paganorum* 'of pagans' to indicate that Asser was refe to the vikings. In *Æthelweard's Chronicle* the word is used for both Old English **here** and **fierd** .


