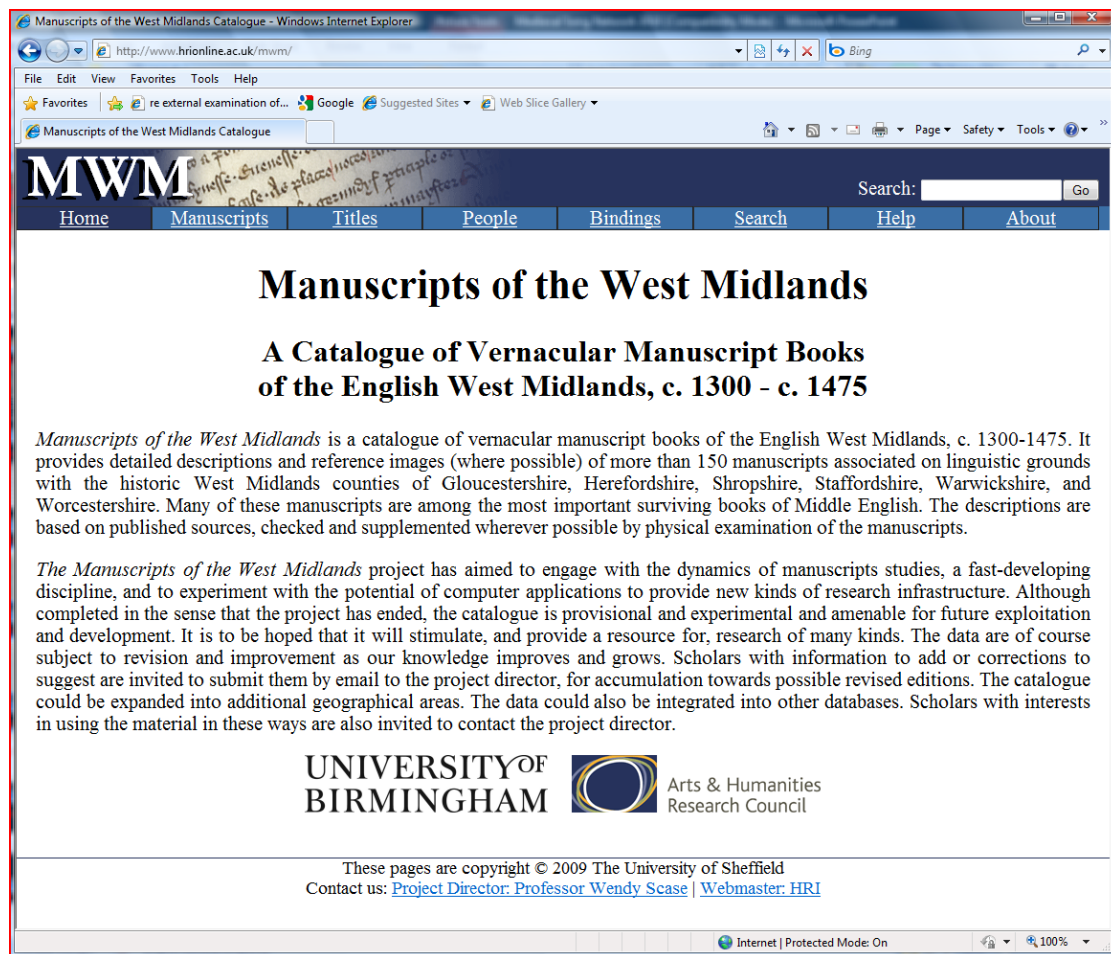

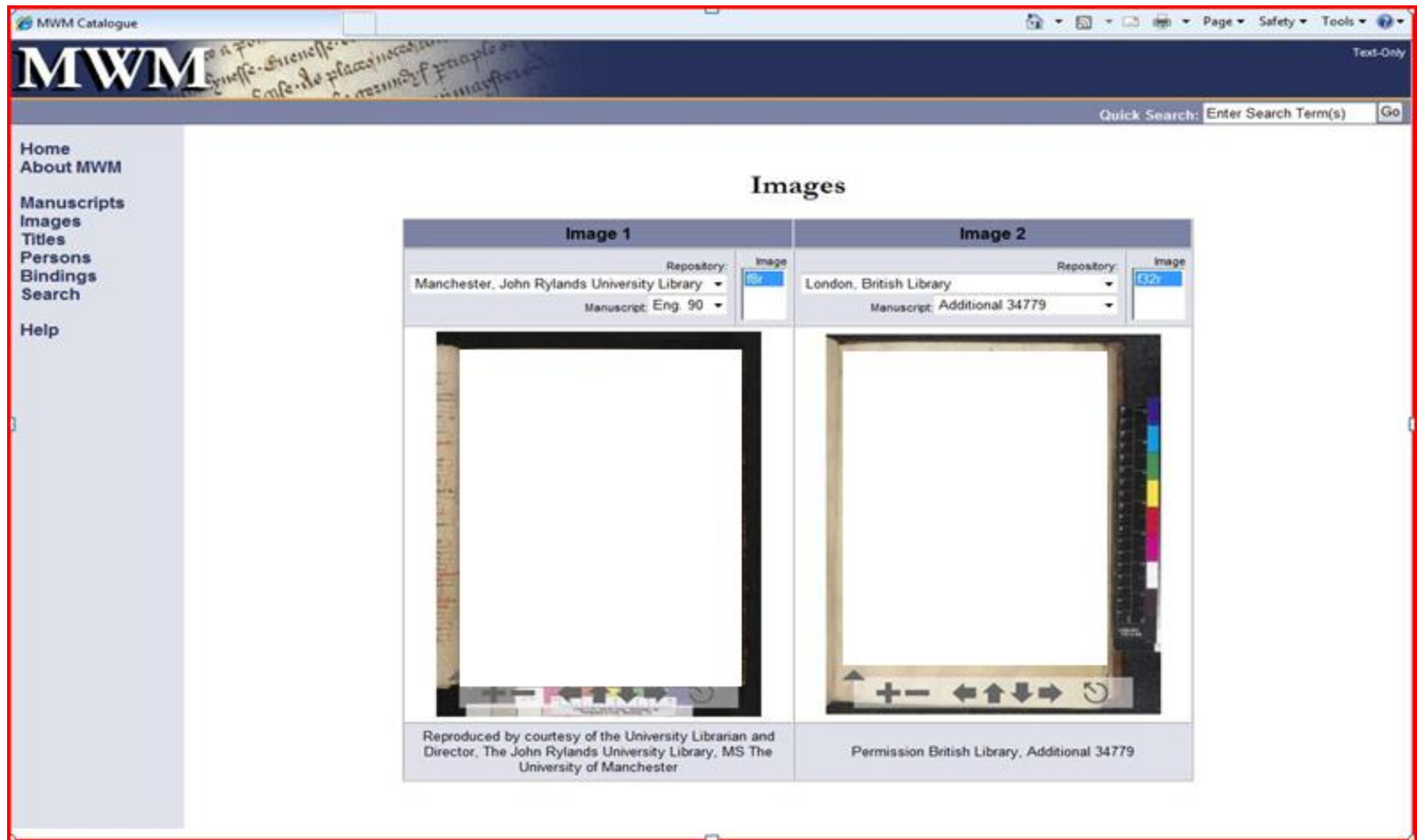

Physical Description

- Form:** Codex
- Support:** Parchment
- Extent:** 310 x 230 mm
- Collation:** 1-27 8 with catchwords. Quire 12 wants 7 (stub remains, initial letters visible). Quire 14 wants 1 (stub remains, initial letters visible).
- Layout:** Pricking of small rounded holes in the header (10 mm from the edge), footer (21 mm from the edge) and external margin (15 mm from the side and 22 mm from the top edge) to indicate the framing space. Writing space: double columns: c. 82 x 23 mm with 39 lines.
- Writing:** One scribe writing in a neat Anglicana Formata hand. In the Latin summaries the hand becomes smaller and more angular, whilst retaining the same degree of cursiveness. Each line terminates with a square-shaped full stop. Double compartment *a*; diamond-shaped lobed *d* with square ascender curving 90 degrees from the left to the right, ending in an otiose hairline; 8-shaped *g* with rounded head, the descender closing into a rounded lobe, finishing in a squarish point attached to the head. This does not extend below the level of writing. There is a small tail on the right of the head; straight descender with a tail on the top left side of the *p*, rounded head with shaft starting from the right towards the left, finishing just past the meeting point with the descender; long and short *r* are used both in medial and final position; long *r* in conjunction with 'er', short *r* with 'or'; long and sigma *s* used regularly; no rounded *s*; dotted *b*; the stem of *b* is slightly bent towards the left by 45 degrees, ending with a small tail, the shaft does not extend past the stem/descender, it is used regularly in initial and final position; open *w* with the first stem terminating in a small tail and the second back stroke extending above the level of the letter turning towards right with a sharp angle and terminating with a tail. Two closed lobes finish the letter on the right side. Capital letters are decorated with double lines across the ascenders, otiose dots in the lobes of letters. Body height: 3 mm in the English text; 2 mm in the Latin.
- Decoration:** The first page has a full border decorated in blue, red and gold with leaf motifs prominent on the external margin. First letter of the first word of the prologue is a two-line capital in gold, with red and blue background. No other decoration except for two-line Lombardic capitals in blue with red penwork decoration to indicate the beginning of each section. Initial letters of each line are tinted in yellow. Other Litterae Notabiliores written in blue or red, no paragraph marks.

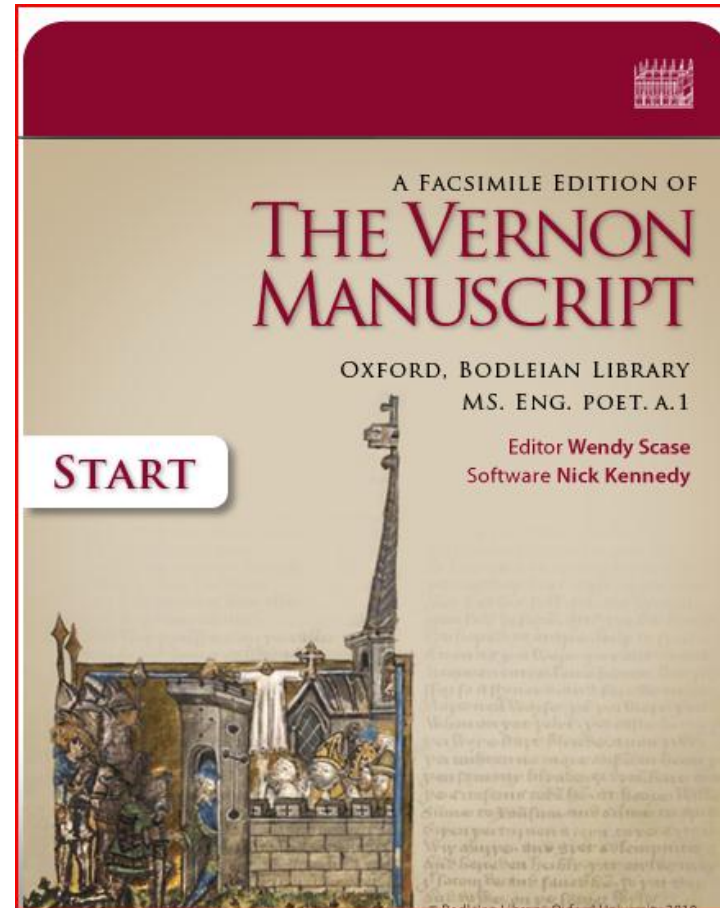
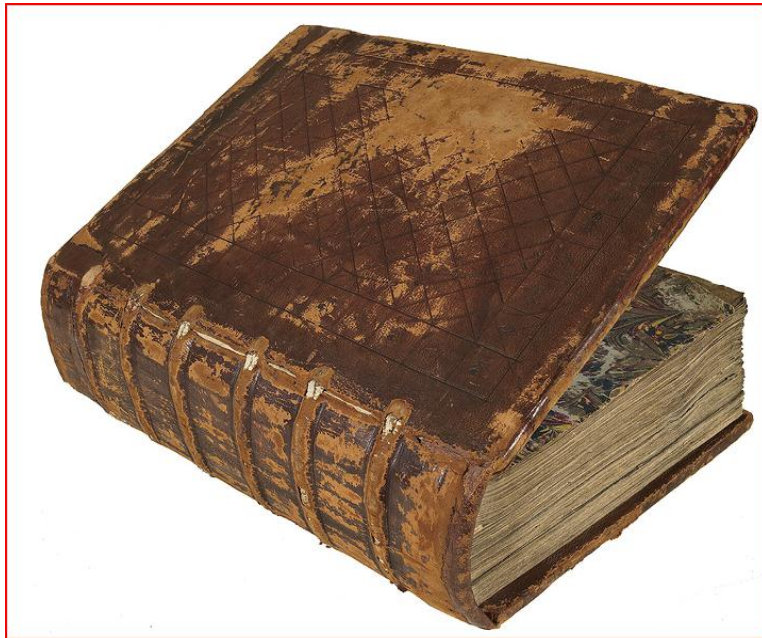

A Medieval 'Data Deluge'

350 folios (69 folios lost)

c. 370 different items – all devotional and religious, prose and verse, almost all in Middle English

Word count: 2.5 x Tolstoy's *War and Peace*

16 Miniatures (c. 52 lost)

Digitising the Data Deluge: Aims

Metadata + images (images alone are of limited use)

An accurate text to parallel the images in the edition

A corpus of linked data exploitable for research

Policies on Data Capture

Working with digital files, we could record:

Changes of ink

Sharpening of pen

Letter forms

Marks of abbreviation

Policies on Data Capture (2)

Considerations:

Equivalent to transcribing *War and Peace* 2.5 times

Three years to do it

Over-riding aims are accuracy and consistency

A team effort

Policies on Data Capture (3)

Decisions:

Resist interpretation; don't embed assumptions

Have simple rules and stick to them (even if the result looks odd, for example capitalisation and word division)

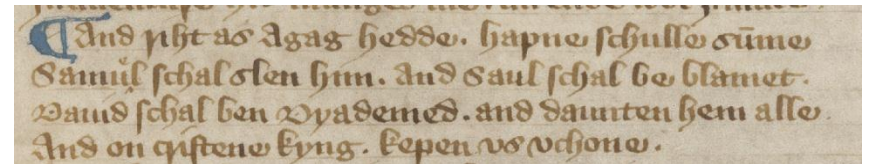
Record data in format that can be re-used, added to, developed (in xml)

Allocation of data to Transcription and Description files –not strict TEI

scribes, A & B

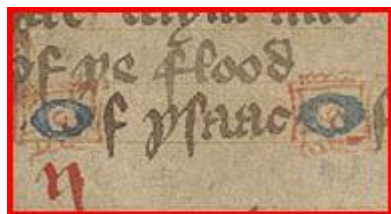
Linguistic analysis locates

Qu. 1: Did Scribe A Decorate his Text?

Scribe A and Flourisher form <Y> and <þ> (thorn) indistinctly

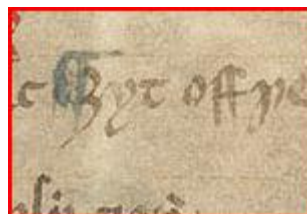

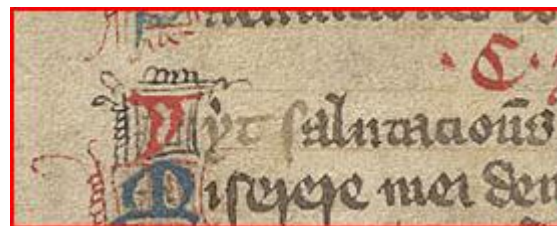
Flourisher

But Scribe A uses <Y> only for /i/ (e.g. *Ysaac*)

For /j/ (471 instances) Scribe A uses <3> (yogh) (e.g. *3yt* = yet)

Whereas for /j/ Flourisher also uses <Y> (e.g. *Yyt* = yet)

Answer: No!

Qu. 2: Provenance of Flourisher?

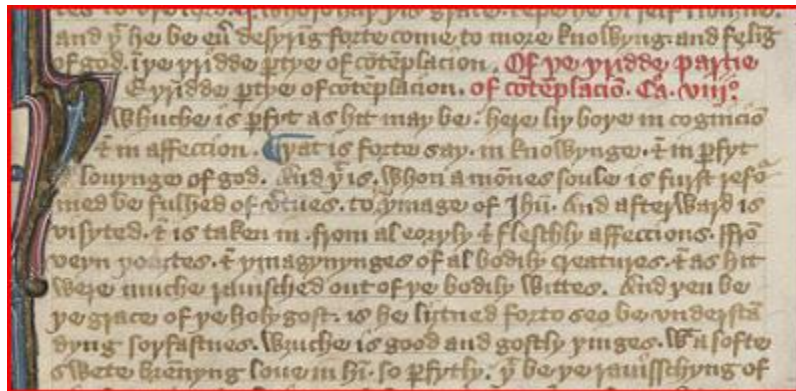
Scribe A is located in West Midlands on linguistic grounds

Flourisher's graphemic profile (<Y> = <þ>) is associated with areas *outside* the West Midlands

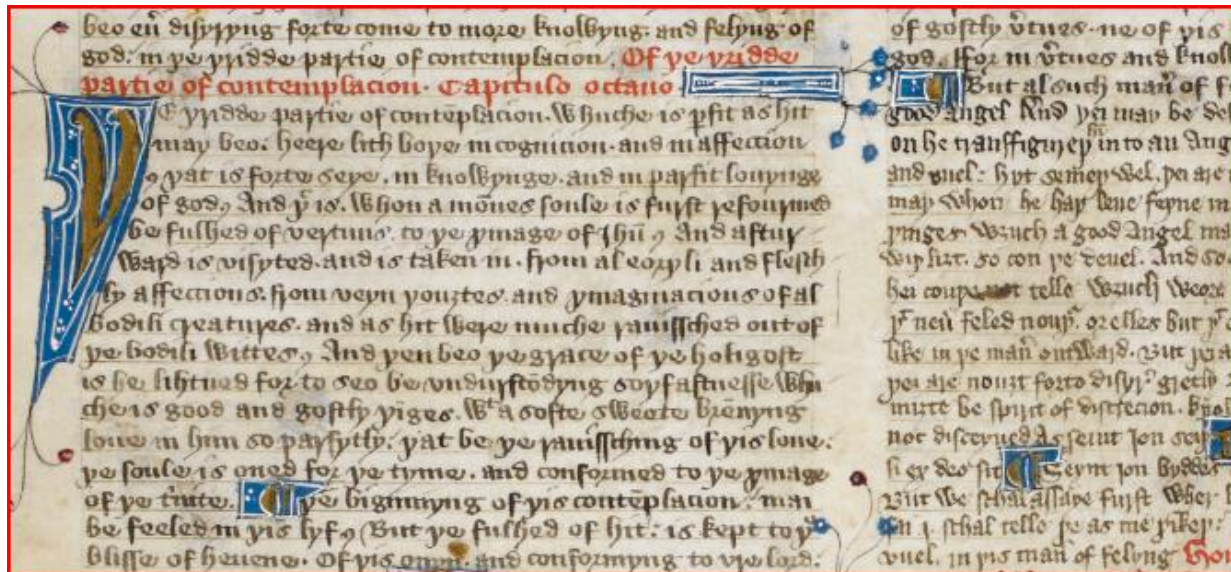
Further Research Possibilities

- Could also use transcription + description + images to investigate, for example, what constrains scribe's variations in his practice – e.g. why does he abbreviate here and not there? Why this form of a letter here and that there?
- Creation of and linking to new corpora e.g. Simeon MS (BL Addit. 22283) would support further research along these lines

Exploiting Corpora to Enhance Palaeographical Research

Vernon and MWM projects offer examples of how

- **linking corpora of different genres within and across resources**
- **and analysis through cross-referencing of palaeographical methods with other methodologies (e.g. linguistic profiling)**

can lead to insights
